About the journal:

Epidemiologic Perspectives & Innovations is an open-access, peer-reviewed, online journal of epidemiologic research methods, applications, critical overviews, teaching tools, perspectives, and other analytic work, published by BioMed Central. We welcome submissions related in any way to epidemiology (which we define as quantitative research on health, where people or populations are the unit of analysis, including both population and clinical research).

Epidemiologic Perspectives & Innovations was specifically designed to bring together articles about research, research methods, policy, philosophy, history and social sciences and provides a forum for anything in or about epidemiology other than standard research reports of new findings. Of particular interest are articles about policy and practices in the field. Unlike other epidemiology journals, it emphasizes articles which are accessible and of interest to a broad range of health researchers, teachers, practitioners, and policy-makers, rather than those appealing primarily to a few specialists in a particular subfield.

Most of the journal's editors are epidemiologists, and they are actively interested in publishing articles on philosophy, history, and social-studies of epidemiology. This creates an opening for exposure to a readership of scientists and other professionals who might not normally seek out journal articles in those fields.

For works that introduce ideas from the social sciences, philosophy, history, or other fields outside of traditional health science, we welcome new versions of papers that may have already been published in discipline-specific journals that are less likely to be read by health researchers. This provides the opportunity to communicate with an audience that might benefit from learning more about history, philosophy, or social science. Such papers should be rewritten to provide adequate background for people who are not specialists in your field, clearly reference the original and acknowledge what is drawn from previous publications

Publication in EP&I and other open-access health science journals is normally supported by payments from the authors' research grants. Authors from fields outside of health science who do not have such funding should request a fee waiver, citing that lack of large grant funding, and the waiver will normally be granted. The open-access model allows maximum dissemination of your ideas, with authors retaining copyright for their own work.
